The goal of the ESC-20 TEHCY SSA is to enhance staff capacity and to promote the academic success of students experiencing homelessness by increasing awareness of the McKinney-Vento Act, the rights of eligible students, as well as by ensuring equitable access to available support, resources, and services to which students are entitled. Specific: McKinney-Vento liaisons and staff within partner LEAs will build capacity to identify and support students experiencing homelessness; Measurable: There will be a 1% increase per year in student identifications (3% over 3 year cycle) and training will be provided for each partner LEA annually; Achievable: ESC-20 staff is committed to working with LEAs to achieve this outcome; Relevant: This will lead to equitable access to resources and student success; Timely: Progress will be evaluated quarterly by LEAs and the ESC at scheduled check-ins.

The ESC-20 team continuously monitors grant activities to ensure that the program is on track to meet stated goals and objectives. This is accomplished through the strong rapport built with LEAs and through ongoing communication regarding best practices, TEA updates, and procedural changes. The ESC-20 team also conducts site visits and regular evaluations of program activities. Any feedback and data received is used to make needed adjustments. The ESC-20 team follows the Plan-Do-Study-Act (PDSA) model, and this drives our focus on continuous improvement. Therefore, we regularly monitor grant activities and adjust as needed to ensure alignment with goals and to best meet the needs of our LEAs and MV eligible students. Documentation, including email correspondence and survey data, is kept to track program activities, milestones reached, and adjustments needed. If at any time an amendment to the grant is necessary in order to meet the evolving needs of MV eligible students and partner LEAs, such actions will be supported through documented data, and meetings will be held to discussed planned changes associated with any amendments.

The ESC-20 team and partner LEAs will review data on a quarterly basis to monitor identification numbers, trainings provided, attendance rates, referrals to CBOs, and student academic success. If benchmarks toward desired outcomes do not show progress, the ESC-20 team will work individually with partner LEAs to identify gaps and address barriers to the success of students experiencing homelessness. The ESC-20 team will also partner closely with LEAs to ensure that MV eligible students have equitable access to resources and that they have the academic and wraparound support necessary to meet state academic standards.

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9. Statutory Requirements

In organizing the ESC-20 SSA, staff reviewed the eligibility list for districts and extended the invitation to districts with a substantial amount of students identified as homeless and limited staff for program management. Of the invitations extended, we had 21 districts that expressed a desire to participate: Bandera ISD, Boerne ISD, Carrizo Springs ISD, Comal ISD, Crystal City ISD, Dilley ISD, Eagle Pass ISD, Edgewood ISD, Floresville ISD, Harlandale ISD, Inspire Academies, Jubilee Academies, Judson ISD, Lighthouse Public Schools, Medina Valley ISD, Pleasanton ISD, Somerset ISD, South San Antonio ISD, Southside ISD, Southwest ISD, and Southwest Preparatory School. To address the needs of this varied group of LEAs, we will follow two approaches. First, partner districts will be able to respond to their specific needs through an amount allocated for their district based on homeless students enrolled. If awarded this grant, we will work with our partner districts to review their needs assessments, district improvement plans, and campus improvement plans to ensure that their designated funds are expended in alignment with their identified needs. Second, this grant will allow the ESC-20 team to provide McKinney-Vento trainings, professional development, and technical assistance for our 21 partner LEAs. Previous grant funding has allowed us to build a strong platform for networking and sharing of best practices among McKinney-Vento liaisons and has provided opportunities to partner with CBOs. We will continue to build upon this collaborative approach and expand services to further meet the needs of McKinney-Vento liaisons and district staff in our region. ESC-20 will continue to use a quarterly review format with partner districts to discuss use of funds, McKinney-Vento student identification, attendance, and academic achievement, as this approach has proven valuable in assessing LEA needs and implementing changes to lfacilitate student success.

Coordination among existing ESC-20 programs and community partners is an integral element for the success of the TEHCY program. The ESC-20 Regional McKinney-Vento Liaison currently serves on the Close to Home Continuum of Care Membership Council and participates in the San Antonio Homelessness Round Table, which work to address homelessness within our community. The ESC-20 team also partners closely with Haven for Hope (homeless shelter) and other CBOs in order to identify resources and strategies for reducing youth homelessness, with a particular focus on decreasing rates of unaccompanied youth. At ESC-20 there is close collaboration between the McKinney-Vento consultants and the Federal Programs Coordinator. This working relationship helps to ensure that both programs receive ongoing updates and coordinated messages on any changes impacting their programs. The Federal Programs Coordinator regularly provides training to McKinney-Vento liaisons on the development and evaluation of Campus and District Improvement Plans. Our current grant also coordinates activities with the Migrant Education Program, Parent and Family Engagement Specialist, Title I Specialist, Special Education Department, Counseling Specialist, Mental Health Liaison, Safety Education Officer, Accountability Program, Head Start personnel, Food and Nutrition Services, Transportation Services, and Foster Care. We will further seek to coordinate efforts with GT and CTE groups in order to enhance the knowledge base of our MV liaisons. It is through these collaborative efforts that we can ensure every effort is being made to remove barriers for children and youth experiencing homelessness and that students have equitable access to available supports and resources. Even though the ESC-20 team has identified 21 partner LEAs to receive direct services through the grant, the training and professional development provided as part of the grant will be available to all districts and charter schools within our region. ESC-20 is committed to educating all LEA staff on the McKinney-Vento Act and the importance of early identification and immediate enrollment in school. We recognize the importance of ongoing education and training for all levels of LEA staff and have worked to remove barriers to professional development by providing hybrid sessions (simultaneously virtual and in-person) at ESC-20, as well as fully virtual webinars and on-site sessions at ESC-20 and LEAs.

A variety of LEA staff, including Federal Program Directors, McKinney-Vento liaisons, counselors, social workers, and attendance clerks, are instrumental in identifying, planning, and coordinating for the needs and services of students experiencing homelessness. Using demographic data, projected student enrollment data, projected homeless student identification data, and local housing and poverty rates, district staff look across programs in order to coordinate services for academic support, supplies, wraparound services, and parental involvement activities. LEA McKinney-Vento liaisons report working with local leadership on the development of the district improvement plan and closely collaborating with campus administrators to ensure strategies to address the needs of homeless students are included within the campus improvement plans. At the ESC level, coordination across program staff is a strong foundational piece toward ensuring LEA staff are hearing the same message regarding identifying needs for specific student populations. The Federal Programs Coordinator at ESC-20 regularly presents at McKinney-Vento liaison meetings and at the New Liaison Academy to ensure that liaisons have a full understanding of the purpose and allowable uses of Title I, Part A set-aside funds and to ensure that services are not duplicated between programs. In reviewing Title 1, Part A and the McKinney-Vento Program Coordination Charts submitted by partner LEAs, it is evident that additional training and support are needed to address the proper allocation and use of Title 1. Part A Homeless Reservation funds. While some LEAs have very structured methods for determining needs, the amount to set aside, and the plans for utilizing the funds, other LEAs struggle to provide concrete data and information. We plan to collaborate with the ESC-20 Federal Programs Coordinator to implement a training to specifically address this need. In addition, the ESC-20 McKinney-Vento Program will also work with partner LEAs to ensure that the needs of homeless students are addressed in both the District and Campus Improvement Plans.

Partner LEA McKinney-Vento liaisons take the lead on the development, review, and revision of LEA polices and procedures related to homelessness. Although the revision process differs among LEAs, consistent themes or areas of need arose, and those themes included: the review and revision of policies and procedures on an annual basis; the involvement of campus McKinney-Vento liaisons, district counselors, and social workers in the development and revision of policies and procedures, especially those pertaining to TAC 89 and transition assistance; ongoing training of LEA staff to ensure the policies and procedures are being consistently implemented across all campuses; and training support for local truancy and discipline policy concerns, as they pertain to MV eligible students.

The ESC-20 Regional McKinney-Vento Liaison reviews all LEA McKinney-Vento Policies and Procedures and individually discusses these with LEAs during grant check-in meetings. Discussions include how the policies and procedures support homeless children and unaccompanied homeless youth and how they ensure that students in these circumstances have equitable access to all available supports and resources in order to meet the same challenging state academic standards established for all students.

TEHCY Program implementation for students who are entering and/or returning to school from summer or holiday breaks focuses on the identification, enrollment, and assessment of services for students experiencing homelessness. While partner LEAs implement diverse strategies for providing services and support at this level, the SRQ is consistently utilized during the enrollment process to assess the living situation of each student. LEAs designate campus points of contact, along with the LEA McKinney-Vento liaison to review each SRQ and identify potential homeless situations. Follow-up with students identified through the SRQ is completed to gather additional information, make determinations of homeless status, and identify the need for additional supports and services. This process also works well with students enrolling as the year progresses. Identifying students experiencing homelessness after the school year has started creates a different challenge and underscores the importance of ongoing staff training. One of the keys to identifying students experiencing homelessness is ensuring that all LEA staff are aware of the McKinney-Vento Act, the definition of homelessness within the education system, and of how to refer students they suspect may be in a homeless situation. Staff training is not limited to teachers. LEAs recognize the importance of training all staff, including those who work in child nutrition, transportation, registrars, early childhood, custodial services, and administration. In addition to educating LEA staff, training community partners is essential to assist with the identification of students not currently enrolled in school and those children eligible for early childhood programs. ESC-20 works to assist partner LEAs in this endeavor by training community partners through MV Liaison meetings, cluster meetings, the Parent and Family Engagement Symposium, as well as presentations at community agencies like Close to Home, Haven for Hope, San Antonio Educational Partnership, City of San Antonio Neighborhood and Housing Department, Head Start, and local colleges and universities.

2. Provide a description of the annual McKinney-Vento professional development plan that is currently in place to increase awareness, support enrollment and identification, and increase staff capacity to respond to the unique educational needs of homeless children and unaccompanied youth. The ESC-20 MV team has a robust McKinney-Vento professional development plan for the 2024-2025 school year and will host numerous workshops on topics that raise awareness and sensitivity to the needs of homeless students. Topics include MV 101, transportation, trauma-informed care, mental health, poverty, human trafficking, suicide prevention, and LGTBQ. Through partnerships with community agencies such as Close to Home, the City of San Antonio, Family Service Association, School House Connections, and Haven for Hope, as well as internal partners at ESC-20 such as PEIMS, the Migrant Education Program, Head Start, Bilingual/ESL, and Federal Programs, participants at trainings will receive current information and updates on issues affecting the educational success of students experiencing homelessness. Two New Liaison Academies will be offered to support liaisons new to their role. ESC-20 will also partner with the TEHCY state program to promote sessions provided. McKinney-Vento liaison meetings will be held locally at the service center, virtually via Zoom, as well as at rural LEAs to allow liaisons the opportunity to network, share best practices, and be introduced to community agencies and resources that can help provide for the needs of students experiencing homelessness. The trainings and McKinney-Vento liaison meetings will be open to all individuals from LEAs within Region 20. ESC-20 serves 98 school districts and charter schools across 19 counties. Thus, trainings have the potential to impact close to 500,000 students. A strong component of our training portfolio is our collaboration with the transportation directors within the region. ESC-20 hosts an annual meeting for transportation directors and McKinney-Vento liaisons to discuss school of origin transportation needs of McKinney-Vento students, identify best practices for transporting students, and ensure all LEAs are aware of current statutory requirements. All professional development offered by ESC-20 includes an evaluation component. Feedback obtained will be used when creating the professional development training schedules for the following grant year and for making adjustments throughout the year.

The TEHCY Program is focused on McKinney-Vento program monitoring, attendance, grades, PEIMS coding, general education, and special program services, and as such, ESC-20 has designed a grant program and activities that address the unique academic needs of elementary homeless children and unaccompanied youth. The program includes referral services, coordination between schools and agencies, school supplies, extraordinary assistance, excess cost of transportation, hygiene items, sleeping items, programs to address truancy, and support for discipline issues. ESC-20's partner LEAs have identified unique strategies to support elementary homeless children and unaccompanied youth through various activities, including: academic and well-being check-ins with homeless students/families focused on addressing barriers to attendance, academic supports, transportation needs, potential exposure to domestic violence, parental mental health, or substance abuse concerns, and referral to community agencies; referral services for mental health counseling; ongoing tracking of attendance to address truancy; collaboration with school administrations to address discipline concerns; and the purchase of school supplies, hygiene items, and sleeping items to meet the needs of homeless students. LEA McKinney-Vento liaisons will monitor the academic progress and attendance of elementary homeless students each grading period and further expand services to address individual student needs. Throughout the grant period, ESC-20 will collaborate internally with counseling consultants, behavior consultants, bilingual consultants, the GT Program, the Head Start Program, and Special Education staff to provide specialized support and technical assistance to assist partner LEAs in addressing the unique needs of elementary homeless children and youth. The ESC-20 MV liaison will maintain ongoing contact with all LEAs to address barriers, provide additional training, and meet with each LEA to review progress on grant goals.

Similar to that above, ESC-20 has designed a grant program and activities to address the unique academic needs of secondary homeless youth that includes a student leadership summit, referral services, coordination between schools and agencies, school supplies, extraordinary assistance, excess cost of transportation, hygiene items, sleeping items, programs to address truancy, support for discipline, and programs to support credit recovery or dual credit. The following are a list of strategies from our partner LEAs used toward the reviewing, monitoring and implementing academic support services to ensure secondary homeless students are on track for grade-level promotion, graduation, and postsecondary options: secondary counselors meet regularly with homeless students to monitor progress, review personal graduation plans, adjust class schedules accordingly to ensure grade level promotion and graduation; LEA McKinney-Vento liaisons address transportation concerns by providing bus passes, as appropriate, as well as other transportation support services; college visits, SAT/ACT prep courses are provided; progress reports, report cards, and attendance are monitored regularly with interventions provided as needed; ongoing collaboration between campus personnel and the LEA MV liaison to address academic issues/concerns; state assessment test results are tracked and monitored for each student and interventions provided as needed; quardians are contacted to ensure they are aware of graduation/promotion requirements and offered FAFSA support. ESC-20 has a secondary school counseling consultant to provide in-depth technical assistance and training for LEAs on graduation and resources to support college and career readiness. The ESC-20 MV liaison will maintain ongoing contact with all LEAs to address barriers, provide additional training, and review progress.
